Meeting on Thursday, October 10th, 2019

The Coweta Falls Chapter met Thursday, October 10th, 2019. President Danny Ginter presided. The meeting opened with an invocation by Chaplain and Compatriot Bill Pruitt, followed by the Pledge to the Flag, and the Pledge to the SAR, lead by Compatriot Bill Hay. Twenty-six members and guests were present.

During lunch, a "Jeopardy" of American Revolution history, led by Wayne Cartledge was played.

The Traveling Trunk has been presented to 486 students this school year. Treasurer Cartledge announced dues statements will be going out shortly. Coweta Falls membership is currently 134, making it the second largest chapter in Georgia.

A Certificate of Appreciation was, from Chapter 7 of the Disabled Veterans of America, presented to the chapter. David Fox, a past president, received a Certificate of membership in the Military Veterans Service Corps. It was signed by the President General John T. Manning. Mansfield Bias, Junior, was presented his certificate of membership.

Mike Tomme, Sr. (Past National President General, 2016) will be a special guest at the Christmas Party.

The State Board of Mangers meeting is October 26th, 2019. The Chapter Board of Managers meeting is October 29th, 2019.

The speaker was First Vice President Tommy Powell. Powell spoke on Fort King George, built in 1721. It was the first fort built by the British in Georgia and was named for King George I. From 1721 until 1736, Fort King George was the southern outpost of the British Empire in North America. A cypress blockhouse, barracks and palisaded earthen fort were constructed by scoutmen of Colonel John Barnwell. For the next seven years, His Majesty's Independent Company garrisoned the fort. They endured incredible hardships from disease, battles with the Spanish (to the South), French (to the West), and Indian attacks, along with the harsh, unfamiliar coastal environment. Great Britain, France, and Spain were competing to control the American Southeast, especially the Savannah-Altamaha River region.

Constructing the fort allowed British domination along the Altamaha River and its surrounding territory. It started a diplomatic feud with the Spanish, eventually leading to war between the two nations. It ended with the British success at the Battle of Bloody Marsh on St. Simons Island in 1742. Though the fort was considered a short-term failure, it greatly contributed to Georgia's establishment and early success.

After the fort was abandoned, General James Oglethorpe brought Scottish Highlanders to the site in 1736. The settlement, called Darien, eventually became a foremost export center of lumber until 1925.

The program concluded with the SAR Recessional, lead by Compatriot David Fox.

Meeting on Thursday, November 14th, 2019

The Coweta Falls Chapter met Thursday, November 14th, 2019. First Vice-President Tommy Powell presided. President Dan Ginter was on vacation in Cuba. The meeting opened with an invocation by Chaplain and Compatriot Bill Pruitt, followed by the Pledge to the Flag, lead by Compatriot Bernie Talley, and the Pledge to the SAR, lead by Compatriot Joe Tarpley. Twenty-six members and guests were present.

Compatriot Charles Maupin, a World War Two veteran, survivor of Normandy, and Charter Member of Coweta Falls (who recently passed away)-was honored with a tribute given by Dr. Hugh Rogers. The tribute was followed with a moment of silence for recently deceased members.

Dr. Rogers also reported there are several applications, along with several supplemental applications, in process of being prepared. They will be sent to NSSAR shortly.

Members were encouraged to make plans for the Christmas Party at Green Island Country Club on December 12th. Ticket sales are currently running slow. Mike Tomme, Sr. (Past National President General, 2016) will be a special guest at the Christmas Party.

Wreaths across America is December 14th, 2019 Coweta Falls will be providing 15 wreaths for graves at the Fort Mitchell and at Fort Benning National Cemeteries.

Compatriot Dan McMichael reminded all to try and attend Frontier Days , held on November 16th and 17th at Franklin Delano Roosevelt State Park in Pine Mountain, Georgia. McMichael will also speak at the January, 2020, meeting on Fort Necessity.

The speaker was Representative Richard Smith, who is also a member of the Coweta Falls Chapter. Representative Smith represents the 134th District. He was first elected to the Georgia House of Representatives in 2004 and sworn in on January 10, 2005. He is currently serving his 8th term in the Georgia House of Representatives and represents portions of Muscogee and Harris counties. He serves as chairman on the Insurance Committee and the Special Committee on Access to Quality Healthcare, is secretary on the Rules Committee, and is a member of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Higher Education, Natural Resources and Environment, and the Legislative & Congressional Reapportionment

Highlighting Representatives Smith's talk were issues facing Georgians in regard to healthcare. Several counties are lacking healthcare facilities and doctors. There are also no air ambulance in any of the healthcare networks in the state. Rural hospitals in Georgia are facing challenging times. Some are closing. Many Georgians are faced with issues of poor access to quality healthcare, inability to pay for medicine, and difficulties getting insurance to cover certain conditions

Representative Smith also spoke on legalized gambling in Georgia. He feels it is a very risky venture of the state. Currently under discussion are plans to legalized casino or horse racing gambling. Other states have had poor results when legalizing these items.






The Traveling Trunk



The Must-Have Christmas Gift of 1776

In 1864, Savannah, Georgia, was offered to Abraham Lincoln as a Christmas present. But in 1776, George Washington delivered one of the greatest gifts in American history: the United States. Winter was a bad season for Washington. His Continental Army had been driven out of New York, and then it was driven out of New Jersey, leaving just a few thousand men shivering on the far side of the Delaware River in Pennsylvania, while the British made camp in New Jersey.

The Continental Army was desperate for a victory. Many men had left the military after finishing their enlistments. Others were low on morale after the series of bitter defeats. Santa, it appeared, was siding with the British forces.

On December 25th, George Washington ordered the few thousand men at his disposal to cross the Delaware River. Ice flowed down its waters—further downstream a unit that was supposed to join him couldn't cross because of the ice flow—but Washington forced his men across, and was one of the first to land on the shores of British-occupied New Jersey.

Through the cold night air and sleet and snow, his men marched another nine miles, and then in a few quick maneuvers, launched a surprise attack against the Hessian forces encamped at Trenton. He took a thousand soldiers prisoner. He killed over 20 and injured almost a hundred. Only two of Washington's soldiers were killed (another man, future President James Monroe, was also injured in the attack).

The men moved back across the Delaware, lugging their artillery and plunder, and settled back in Pennsylvania as victors. It was December 26th.

Trenton was not a strategic win, but it was a psychological one. Recruitment increased. So did morale. For the first time in months it appeared that America would win its independence.
