2024 has turned out to be a challenging year for me. On May 7, while on a Rhine River Cruise, I suffered necrotizing pancreatitis. I was sent to a hospital in Cologne, Germany, where I spent the next three weeks in ICU. When the doctors determined I was well enough to travel I was medevac'd back to the States. I wound up in Piedmont Atlanta, where I underwent major abdominal surgery. By the time I was released I spent 71 consecutive days in the hospital. I am at home recovering now. I am building up my strength every day, and hope to soon be able to start attending Coweta Falls Chapter meetings again.

Coweta Falls continues to be an active chapter thanks to its members. We have attended grave markings, battle commemorations, provided speakers for events and meetings, and more throughout the Southeast. In particular,

- On May 27 we held our 19th Annual Memorial Day Commemoration at Park Hill Cemetery. Mayor Skip Henderson was once again our featured speaker. Thanks to Tommy Powell who orchestrated the commemoration, Danny Ginter who served as Master of Ceremonies in my place, Harry Floyd for bringing his cannon for our salute, and Dan McMichael and the Coweta Falls Color Guard.
- On September 5 four of our chapter members attended the Naturalization Ceremony at the US Court House in Columbus. They gave each of the 24 new citizens a copy of the US Constitution.
- On September 10 Danny Ginter and Wayne Cartledge represented the Chapter at the Columbus City Council meeting, where the Council read the proclamation for Constitution Week. They accepted a copy of the proclamation for the Chapter.

Our Committee Chairs remain quite busy. Danny Ginter and Norm Blankenbeckler have given Traveling Trunk presentations at eight schools. Ryan Meyer von Bremen has awarded twenty Eagle Scout Certificates. Glenn Haskell has taken over the Stark Program and has breathed new life into it. Mansfield Bias has taken over as Editor of our Chapter newsletter. This is our first newsletter in over a year, we're back on track. 

Want a slice of Election Cake this year?

Say what? Yes, during the early years of our nation, elections were not viewed as a chore, but rather with great excitement. No other people were able to choose their leaders. Election Day was a joyous occasion, complete with parades, and parties, with lots of food, booze and.....cake!

cake appeared in 1796 in the first U.S. cookbook, Amelia Simmons' "American Cookery." The cakes could weigh as much as 12 pounds. One early recipe even called for 14 pounds of butter and 10 pounds of sugar.

"Last November, I urged Americans to bake cakes and bring them to the polls, or share with co-workers, or just eat them with family and friends," says Jacobs.

Project Election Cake was a way to remind ourselves and others that democracy is sweet. People in all 50 states joined the movement. Some used that original fig-and-clove recipe from 1796, while others modernized the recipe or themed their cake, be it representing their state or their passion.

Lisa GreenClopton of Georgia added peaches. Virginia's Rachael Dickson topped her cake with a tiny - working - Revolutionary War cannon. (Eat your heart out Skunk Brigade!)

People turned the baking and eating into a neighborhood activity, taking it to the streets, their county election offices, their school classrooms. (Just not too close to the polling areas). Project Election Cake was a way to remind us that our Democratic Republic is sweet.

Interestingly, a group of political scientists published a study in the journal Political Science & Politics back in 2007. The paper, "Putting the Party Back into Politics, recorded their experiment where the researchers set up little festivals with music and food at various voting stations around the country. The result? The festivities boosted turnout by almost 7%

Jacobs says he is doing project Election Cake again this November. Wouldn't it be cool if the SAR/DAR/C.A.R. sponsored some Election Cake festivities this election season?

In the 18th century, Americans made "Election Cake". Actually it started as a "Muster" cake. It was a compact, naturally leavened cross between bread and cake. The spice cake using boozy fruit was baked by colonial women. The cake was provided to the militia who were summoned for military training, or 'mustered,' by order of British regular troops. Society of the Descendants of the Founders of Hartford has found references to the state's 1771 General Assembly reimbursing one Ezekial Williams for the ingredients of an Election Day Cake.

Women would make it in large quantities to encourage men to come to town hall meetings and vote. Full of fruits and nuts, this rich dessert became a staple of Election Day celebrations.

Bestselling author A.J. Jacobs, in an original series for Fox News Digital, has been sharing his year - long adventures of "living" the Constitution. A.J. recently wrote a book, "The Year of Living Constitutionally," about what we can learn from the Founders.

The cakes were a sort of combination of rum cake and fruitcake. Made with figs and cloves, the New England Historical Society, notes the first recipe for American election

Dear Compatriots:

For years the Georgia Society has been a steadfast supporter of Wreaths Across America (WAA). The Society's Sponsorship ID is GA0057, and under this program Chapters or individual Compatriots will receive a free third wreath for every two wreaths they purchase.

Wreaths Across America will ship wreath orders to participating cemeteries nationwide. For example, you have the option of ordering wreaths for shipment to the Marietta or Georgia National Cemeteries, or other eligible cemeteries throughout Georgia. You can also order wreaths for loved ones or friends who rest in cemeteries in other states.

To order wreaths, please phone WAA Customer Service at: [1-877-385-9504](tel:1-877-385-9504). Provide the GASSAR ID Number, GA0057, and confirm that you are participating in the three-for-two program. Provide Customer Service with the Zip Code for the cemetery you want your wreaths shipped to. If your local cemetery does not receive shipments from WAA, you can choose an alternate delivery address for your order. To assure receipt of your wreaths in time for Wreaths Across America Day on December 14, please place your order no later than December 3, 2024.

If your chosen cemetery participates in Wreaths Across America, but does not have a Location Coordinator, you have an opportunity to organize a WAA observance that includes community leaders, nearby Compatriots, and Partners in Patriotism. Your time, mileage and expenses are all creditable as USS Stark Memorial Award activities. For more information about becoming a Location Coordinator, simply call WAA Customer Service. A representative will help you with an event planning package.

Members are encouraged to recommend men for membership. You should be sure that the person really is interested. Also help him understand our organization and the general requirements for membership. The Chapter Genealogist works closely with the Chapter Registrar, David Fox, who finalizes any applications.
